President's Message

This will be my last President's message and I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for the privilege to serve as your President and to summarize the accomplishments of this Division over the past several years.

In the late 1990's it became increasingly apparent that fundamental changes had to be made in the structure of our meets. First our meets were opened to the public; second, because of the number of attendees and table holders had decreased, we no longer required the extensive facilities and attendant cost of the Westover Country Club which resulted in a financial loss to the Division. Beginning in 1998, we held our meets in several other locations: The Holy Cross High School and Norristown Armory. However, these were not professionally run and did not meet our needs, Presently our meets are held at Plumbers Union Hall in Northeast Philadelphia, a location which provides adequate parking, easy

loading and excellent accessibility to major roads. With a stable meet location, we are beginning to see solidification in the number of table holders. At our September meet there was an increase in the number of public attendees. Whether this was in response to an article on the Division in the Northeast Times or is the beginning of a trend remains to be seen and we are endeavoring to increase the number of attendees in the Philadelphia metropolitan area. Should we need additional space there are other buildings in the same industrial complex for expansion.

The paragraph above briefly touched on measures the Division has taken to reduce costs and insure our financial stability. In addition, we have carefully assessed the value of our expenditures. Several years ago, we placed ads for our meets in the National Headquarters News on a trial basis. These did not prove worthwhile and were discontinued. We considered commercial ads for our meets: but found

these prohibitively expensive. Instead we placed notices of our meets in the Activities Section of local newspapers at no cost to the Division. Door and raffle prizes have been purchased at auction or on the internet at the lowest possible price. A dedicated team of Division members has done our mailings at bulk rates to reduce costs to the Division.

The Spring Issue of our newsletter containing the article on the Lionel Standard Gauge "8" set, received compliments from our membership and other division presidents at the National Convention. This article has been reprinted in the October 2003 issue of the Train Collectors Quarterly. The positive response to the article was presented to the Board of Directors. They voted to increase the quality of our newsletter and to include at least one article in color photography each year. It is our goal to make our newsletter the very best.

Finally, I would like to thank the many people who have helped me throughout my tenure in office; but especially to:

Ed Kapuscinski for his many efforts setting up our meets, purchasing door prizes and keeping our Holiday layout program going and more.

Dick Heineman who served as Division Secretary for 26 years and followed this with many hours of work on the Meet Committee.

Bob Robinson and **Stan Petty** who co-authored the Division's Mission Statement and strategic goals.

George Nelson who took over as Division Treasurer and squared away our accounting practices.

Bill Wilson who after serving as Division President, assumed the responsibilities as Publication Committee Chairman and oversees the details of our mailings.

Bob Huppman who has done an excellent job directing the advertising of our meets.

Gary Spear whose hard and diligent work has made our Annual Raffle a smashing success.

Junior Ames for his work as Registration Chairman and permitting the Division to use his home for our mailings.

Phil Ritter for his many years as Modular Layout Chairman and to him and **Dick Zipin** for setting up and moderating the Kid's Races.

Bill Miles for his efforts as By-Laws Chairman and for his invaluable advise during my presidency.

Charles Weber and Chester Zmijewski for creating a newsletter of which we can be proud.

Neal Bradley, Dick Stevenson, Bill McKay and the youthful **Jules Hamburg** for their work at the Registration Desk and our mailings



One of the more unusual items that I have found on **ebay** is shown here. This must be a very unusual






piece of Lionel ephemera, as I never heard of it before. I thought that you might like to see it; but can't provide any details, as I didn't buy it. So we just have these undetailed pictures from off the Internet to look at.

The Grand Prize looks like a complete Lionel layout similar to the ones that would be offered to dealers for display in their shops. To be accurate, it looks like the D-265, 8' X 8' Super '0' operating display that was advertised in the 1959 Dealer catalog. A train set or two would have been added. I sure would like to find the winner of this contest. Wonder if he/she still has it!?

The Second Prize is also interesting in that it appears to be an uncataloged set. The locomotive is a 2242 New Haven A-B lash up but the cars are different from the catalog consist. The regular 2242 set contained an aquarium car, a 3650 searchlight extension car, a 6464-275 boxcar, a flatcar with helicopter and a 6427 caboose. As far as I can tell the Second prize set contains a cop & hobo gondola car, an atomic energy disposal car, a 3662 milk car, a flatcar that could be a 3361 lumber car and a cboose that I can't identify.

The Third Prize could be the cataloged set #1619W less the dummy A unit; but I can't really make it out to even make an educated guess. By any chance were you one of the winners of this contest? If so, please give us a holler.

Here is another item I found on **ebay** some time ago and I have submitted it because it gave me a good chuckle!



Note the seller's description: "Has some light surface rust, 1933, Looks to be complete." Well, yes, it appears to be complete; but it dates closer to 1940 – '42 than 1933. However, "Light surface rust?? HA! It is so bad that the car is good for only the junk box. Personally, I have junked better ones over the years.

On the positive side, with 20 minutes to go in the auction, no one had started the bidding at the \$24.50 that the buyer had requested. I could see someone buying it at a meet (no shipping charges) for \$5.00 or so for parts – maybe.

A second offering that made me chuckle was more subtle as it is not the least bit funny unless you are an educated buyer.



Here is the title and the seller's description. "Very Rare Lionel 1932 Macy's Special Set Box!"


"This item is a set box for the much sought after Lionel 352E Macy Special Set from 1932. The set consists of the Standard Gauge 10E Locomotive, 332, 339, and 341 Pass. Cars. The box is in the condition shown. Has some stains and three corners of the top need to be mended. The box bottom is in excellent condition and inside is marked 352B."

The reasons that I find it funny are: (1) The box was from 1925 – '28, based on the labels, and not 1932. (2) There is nothing on the box to indicate that it was

sold at Macys. It is probably just a box from the most common of 10 sets, the good old peacock version.

The bottom line was different from the previously described Junker offering. With 9 minutes to go, 14 people had driven the price to \$132.50 and the "reserve had not been met"!

Finally, here is an interesting item, although not funny. It was being offered by, "jumpnet", TCA 86-23666. It is nice to see someone offering a "FAKE" who lists it as such.



This item was listed as, "Lionel 6464-725 NH in WHITE!!!" The description given was as follows. Think this is real???? I don't. Id bet its an orange car that has been given the old acid treatment. Any way, it's in EX+ condition and will make a conversation piece. The color is more off white." With 53 minutes to go, this item was up to \$105.00.

In another vein, "The Whistle Stop" is a little magazine that, I suspect, many of our readers never heard of. Thirty-one issues were published from June 1950 through December 1952 when it became "0 Gage Modeler". It continued as such for all of 1953. It was directed toward '0' gauge, somewhat like "0GR"is today. To quote their masthead, "0 Gauge Model Railroading, Scale – Tinplate – Hi Rail – Traction".

In the January 1952 issue there was an article on, "Tinplate Catalog Reproductions. The article goes on to describe the reproductions produced by Don La Spaluto and William R. Clapper. It also mentioned that in 1948 the "Old Train Shop of Philadelphia" released reprints of Ives catalogs from 1912 and 1916. This posses a question that I hope one of you can help us answer. That is who was behind the operation of this shop and how many catalogs did they reproduce? Also do any of you own either of the catalogs mentioned. Please contact us.

Speaking of magazines, I have two issues of a publication that is quite similar in format and content

as our old "Atlantic Division Express". It is called the "M.T.A. Express, Monthly Publication of the Model Train Association". I have vol.1, issue 8 and an undated issue containing "President's Letter No. 6". They appear to be from 1968 – 1972 or so and all the officers are from the Los Angeles, CA. In addition the advertisers are from this area as well. Who can tell us anything about the "M.T.A."?
