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

.Train Shows at Penns Landing Caterers, November 19th, 2017 and January 7th, 2018



Vendors and visitors to the <u>November 19th</u> show once again overcame partially closed streets – as happened at the September show—because the Philadelphia Full-Marathon race was in progress. (note: the 2018 November show date is the 4th). Nevertheless, the attendance was great and the pre-holiday selection was abundant. The children and parents were fascinated with our new layout and the 17 action push –buttons.

In addition, Matthew Tanaka displayed his N scale layout which he calls 'Showa Line Japanese N Scale' depicting an urban to mountain landscape with a Godzilla statue on a 3 ft. X 7 ft. base. Taking almost two years to complete,

the layout has three independent loops passing through a variety of terrains built from a combination of carved *Styrofoam* and covered with plaster cloth, then landscaped with a variety of commercially available materials







In the trading hall, AD member Rich Zipin showed the results of months of experimentation to find the right materials to reproduce flags & flag posts for certain pre-war Standard Gauge locomotives for his personal need. After success in the finding just the right materials and reproduction process he is offering these replicas to fill the needs of others.

It used to be that you could spend a whole day in the Central Jersey area visiting five train stores: Nicholas Smith, Great Traditions, Loco Louie's Shop, Joe's Trains and Trains and Things starting after rush hour traffic and ending by closing a store at 9:00 PM. Alas there are only three stores left and the traffic is terrible due to the construction of the I-95 bridge. Fortunately, for those of us living close to Ewing, NJ, Trains and Things is doing well with lots of collections on display.

The owner, Tony Chiarello, believes in the old school marketing technique of Ceiling to Floor Product Display. Think of his store as the three rail catalogs on display in three dimensions.



So if you wish to spend some time at an exciting train store, visit Trains and Things located at 236 Scotch Road, Ewing, NJ. It is a feast for the eyes. <u>Using Styrofoam for your railroad - N Scale under construction (BNSF Hi-Line Division)</u> By Bill Erskine (86-24379)

There are some interesting developments since our initial report about Dan Pantaleo's developing N scale BNSF's Hi Line Division set in northwestern Montana. He wired the switches to the switch controllers in place, and put up some fascia board for some of the layout,



the layout develops, Dan is starting experimentation some with scenery in N scale. While experienced in building scenery for his previous O gauge layout he is learning to judge the use of materials and their application for N scale. Some initial passes at adding scenic elements are shown in the foreground and far





Working in N scale for the first time, judging scale and application of materials is an interesting and challenging aspect of building this layout. Here two N scale covered haulers are shown as they will exit and enter the wool chip lot at Plum Creek Lumber. The evergreen trees are HUGE.

The BNSF main line crosses the Flathead River shown here with handmade piers. Once the river base, paint and coating are added, the piers will fit right in. The Rocks are part of the developing McDonald Falls on the Flathead River. Note the single spruce tree in the distance that will be on a promontory extending into the river. To the right of the right of way at that point will be a steep-sloped tall mountain with talus slopes.

Feature Article

2nd In The Legacy Train Store Series. S&H Hardware, 6700 Castor Ave Philadelphia 19149. By Mike Hudek, (90-32044)

The original S&H Hardware (stands for Samuel & Harold) opened its doors in 1951 and is still listed as a Lionel Dealer. Over three generations the merchandise changed to serve the needs of the community. On a recent visit, the only trains present for sale were a few Lionel boxed starter sets and some accessories.





Growing up in the Mayfair section of Philly, S&H was a popular place to buy trains. I remember my father taking my brother and I there in the mid 60's and giving us \$2.00 each to buy trains. We both came home with an American Flyer 21158 blue Switcher Engine.



They were the fastest engines we had and spent a lot of time running them, mostly off the track. In the early 90's my son would bring them to the *Members Only Meet* at the <u>Westover Country Club</u> in Jeffersonville, PA and win the drag races that were routinely held. The engines are now retired as the plastic wheels are falling apart.

My next experience with S&H was in the late 80's when I got back into trains. S&H had a thriving repair business and it was where I took all of my engines for repair/service. At that time, S&H had many trains - all of the new issues from Lionel and American Flyer. They had some vintage

trains but, mostly new trains. I purchased my son's first set at S&H, a Southern GP9 freight set; it still runs great.

Through the mid 90's, I was a regular visitor to S&H. As I made train friends around the country, they would ask me to look for specific trains and many times, I would find them at S&H. The train guy at S&H, Harold, loved cash and would cut some great deals. I bought many trains from Harold and shipped them to all parts of the country.

I changed jobs in the late 90's and was not able to get to S&H. I did stop by on occasion when I was visiting my Mom but, until my recent visit, about 10 years had passed. It was sad to see the sparse selection and I could not get anyone who knew the train related stock or could answer questions. Afterwards I looked on their website and they still list trains for sale but the link to TRAINS was 'Not Available'; the links to mailboxes and plumbing supplies worked. I called the store and they said they still do repairs. Maybe not all is lost. If you are in the neighborhood, stop in and see what remains on the shelves.
