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

50 Years of Activities — A Look Back

<u>The Beginning</u>: The origin of the slogan on our newsletter "Where the TCA Began" recognizes a small group of model train hobbyists in the Delaware Valley in the 1950's who routinely met at member's homes to talk about model trains and accessories, their variations and variety, and where to find them for collecting and for their layouts. From these meetings and a similar one in California, a national organization was created with a main office in Strasburg, PA. The organization grew and in 1970, 20 members received permission to establish a separate local group--Delaware Valley Chapter (**DVC**) in the Eastern Division of the TCA. In 1978, the Atlantic Division was chartered by overwhelming vote of the Chapter's membership. For more details, go to ADTCA.com and click on 'About Us'.

Train Meets

50 Years of Places and Events (Part 1 of 4)

Train meets and shows have always provided a place where hobbyists can purchase/trade/sell items, establish friendships, and share their hobby with family. Initially the DVC held two 'major' Meets (only TCA members)-and two 'minor' Meets (for only families of Chapter members) divided equally between New Jersey and Pennsylvania. The major meets were for studious collecting while the minor meets were for having fun (selling/trading, games, movies, seminars in a party-like scene. Later, the 'minor' meets were eliminated but the idea of four per year continued and occasionally, a fifth one was added for a special purpose.

The meets first were for members only (at one time, a member's business meeting preceded opening but was dropped). When attendance declined, the Meets were opened to the public, but the first hour was reserved for members only-this continues today. The contests for children (drag race, hill climb, and demolition derby) were continued with trophies-but only the drag race is offered (occasionally) today. Food and coffee were always available and, previously at one NJ location, even a full breakfast.

From 2000 to 2014, several members continuously provided displays of the variety and diversity of locomotives, rolling stock, and accessories, from their collections for educational purposes and to promote collecting and the hobby. With time and circumstances, the locations changed for a variety of reasons-poor service, unexpected cancellation, too expensive. Traveling Layout Exhibits

In 1979 a modular O gauge layout (3 sections) was built by Phil Ritter with the purpose of providing children with some hands-on



operation. It was shown more than 80 times at a variety of places and was a great showpiece for young and old. In 2004, a new

travelling layout, smaller but heavier, was built by Bob Zmijewski, son of President Chester Zemijewski, from a design by Paul Fenn. With front-mounted pushbuttons that activated the accessories, it provided a 'hands-on' feature for the kids while the trains rolled around the track. It was used until 2017 and magically grew heavier each year as judged by the layout crew. Today, the travelling layout is, once again, a modular layout with four 3 by 6-foot sections and outfitted with even more pushbuttons and some computer activated accessories for kids of all ages. HOW TO MAINTAIN YOUR TRAINS

If you find your model engine is losing performance quality and you can be sure there is not an electrical problem, then the most likely cause is dirt and solidified lubricants. The fix is to disassemble, clean, and lubricate the engine. This process is a little messy and requires some degree of patience and care. However, it is not expensive, takes very little time, and will make a big difference in many cases.

There are several oils and grease available. Woodland Scenic sells a kit with various assortments of light oil and grease. Lionel, Atlas, and Labelle all sell lubrication kits. *Caution:* <u>Do not use 3-in-One</u> <u>Oil on your trains!</u> In the early 1940's, Lionel cautioned that it may affect the Lionel castings, and in the 1950's, they stated that *3-in-One Oil* would attack the plastic bodies as well as the paint. Most lubrication sold today is plastic compatible. Your locomotive usually comes with a diagram showing lubricating points. There are repair manuals for Lionel, American flyer, MTH for O and S scale and for HO and N scale that show various locomotives and cars how to service them.


Before starting, if you are not sure how to go about disassembling your engine, ask! At the Atlantic Division meets usually we have members on hand willing to show you the lubricating process. Also check your local hobby shop for some help.

To start, remove the engine shell by turning the engine upside down and removing screws or gently prying open the plastic tabs, and set the shell aside. Next with a quarter-inch flat brush, remove all visible dirt, fibers, dust and debris using short, quick strokes. Remove trapped debris with

tweezers and toothpicks as necessary. Then apply a small amount of denatured alcohol to a clean cloth and gently wipe down the chassis, wheels, axles and motor to remove dirt, grease and grime; a cotton swab or toothpick will finish the job where necessary.

Now you're ready to begin. The recommended oilers typically have a needle point dispenser. If not, then pour a small amount of model engine lubricant into a clean bottle cap. Dip a toothpick into the engine lubricant and apply small amounts of oil to the wheel bearings, axle bearings, gear shaft and motor bearings; bearings are the points_of-contact that restrict motion of moving parts and are typically plastic, metal rings, or housings that hold a shaft or other part in place. For the gears, use a gear oil or grease. *Never over oil or things will get messy; a small drop of oil goes a long way.* Finally, test the engine on the track before putting the shell back on and re-lubricate as necessary.

Often overlooked are the wheels themselves; and this applies to your rolling stock too. Clean wheels signify clean track, which often is not the case. To clean these, *do not use steel wool;* Instead, use a Dremel tool with a brush attachment to make the wheel cleaning job faster or a small



wire brush. Be sure to wear safety glasses when using your Dremel tool.

I found that grease used by Lionel on post war locomotives tend to harden over time and will need to be cleaned and regreased. When I purchase a 1950's era Lionel F-3 diesels, these seem to always have a grease problem. The power trucks must be disassembled cleaned out of the old hard grease and new reapplied. These are just a few pointers to keep your fleet
