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

This year was limited due to COVID, therefore we concentrated on the Model Railroad

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

What is Collecting and How to Start /Increase/Enhance your Collection

[Ed: Garry Spear, President of the Division in 2011 offered the following suggestions in the *Summer 2011,* issue of the *Express ;* available on our web site in <u>Resources</u>. For comparison, here is an edited-for-space version from the U.S. Mint. There are many correlations between coin and train collecting. Substitute *train* for *coin* in the text from the U.S. Mint. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

While thinking about the AD "Pre-1970s" train meet (Saturday, June 4, 2011) hosted by Ted Maurer and Bob Robinson, I started to wonder what types of collectors there are and how the meet would appeal to them.

A short list of collector types: Historic, Classic, Nostalgic, Manufacturer, and Condition are five type of collections that quickly come to mind.

My list of definitions:

Historic: A collection that is aimed at old items say 90 to 100 years or older. This can be further sub-typed by wood, metal, floor toys, manufacturer, cast iron, tin, etc.

Classic: A collection that is aimed at items for a selected year range. A classic "Standard" gauge collection would be 1920 to 1940. A classic "O" gauge collection could be pre-war or postwar. A classic "HO" gauge collection might be pre-1950.

Nostalgic: A collection driven by some fond memory. Trains you had as a child, trains owned by a parent, grand-parent, some other fond relative or good family friend.

Manufacturer: A collection of items by one manufacturer. This collection may include non train items; such as toys, building sets (Erector, Struktiron), chemistry sets, house- hold appliances, military items, etc.

Condition: A collection in which being in the best condition is the primary criterion for being in the collection.

Collection themes: Country, Time period, Finish, Denomination, Mint mark, Design theme, Artist

Error Coins

Although most error coins are recycled before they ever leave a Mint facility, the few that make it into circulation are often considered collectibles.

Examples include: <u>Off-center strikes</u>, <u>Multiple</u> <u>strikes</u>, <u>Overstrikes</u>, <u>Clipped planchets</u>, <u>Defec-</u> <u>tive Dies</u>

Build Your Collection

Before adding a coin to your collection, consider:

- ...# Is the coin appealing to you?
- ...# How lustrous is it?

..# Is it damaged? Scratches, bag marks, staple marks, and corrosion decrease a coin's value. How worn is it? Wear tends to be the biggest factor in determining a coin's grade.

Buying and Trading Coins

Find coins through: <u>Collectors</u> (privately or through coin clubs), <u>Dealers</u>, <u>Show</u>s (national or local coin shows), <u>Auctions</u> (rarest and most expensive are often available only through auctions). *Tip: compare prices to avoid overpaying and verify a reasonable return policy before ordering*, <u>Flea Markets and Antique Shows</u> (found at various events, but less competition can encourage inflated prices or selling "problem coins").

Coin Grading Scales - The Sheldon coin grading scale is used to determine a coin's value, based on factors such as how well the coin was made, how much wear it's developed, and the luster. A coin is assigned a number between 1 and 70, as well as an adjective such as poor, good, very fine, or mint state. The grade is listed as "MS-70" or "F-15".

Coin Clubs - Coin clubs allow you to share your collection with others and learn more about coins. There are many national and local clubs and numismatic organizations.

FIRST TIME PRE-70'S TRAIN MEET

Saturday, June 4th was a great day for a Train Meet, blue skies, not too warm and an innovative meet idea from Bob Robinson and Ted Maurer – a 'Pre 1970 only train sale'. The Meet was held at a familiar place to many collectors - the Ridge Fire Company Social Hall, about 5 minutes drive south of Spring City, PA, a small town about 40 miles west of Philadelphia in rural Chester County. The parking lot was packed with cars, campers, and pick-up trucks with license plates showing

Virginia, New York, New Jersey, and maybe farther way – didn't walk all the rows because I wanted to get inside and check-out the collectables.

The ladies at the registration table welcomed everyone in their cheery way and accepted a small entrance donation – all profit will be donated to charity - and in return provided the name badge all of us are used to wearing. Through the second set of doors and to the left and right were halls now filled with tables loaded with trains, books, accessories from 90 to 40 years ago (1920 – 1970) instead of chairs for an auction....

ATLANTIC DIVISION SUPPORTS SHRINERS HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN

Your Board of Directors voted in 2010 to take on a local program of charitable giving in keeping with the National TCA's community outreach mission statement. In November of that year, the Division donated 20 new Hess trucks to the U.S. Marine's Toys for Tots program.

For 2011, the Shriners Hospital for Children in Philadelphia was nominated and then selected to be our program's beneficiary of the proceeds from a Pre-70's Train Meet-

sponsored and significantly supported by Ted Maurer and Bob Robinson. To publicize the Meet, the Division obtained permission from Shriners Hospital to use their name in any advertisements for this event both locally and in the National Headquarters News. The Meet was held on Saturday, June 4th and several articles about it appeared in the fall run of the AD Express newsletter

When the Division learned that there was a specific need by the Hospital for the repair of a portable radiological device that allows physicians to see the exact placement of hardware, wires, and hip casts during surgery, all of the Meet's proceeds, amounting to \$2812.00 and an additional amount of \$813.00 was donated to the hospital to cover the total repair cost.

As a token of their appreciation of our support, Mr. Mario Salvati, Director of Financial Services at Shriners, sent a letter on August 2, 2011 to Gary Spear and arranged for a plaque to be given to the Division as a small token of their appreciation

The letter says "We are extremely appreciative of your generosity. With donations like yours, we have been able to provide state-of-the-art medical care to over half a million children since our first hospital opened in 1922".

He goes on to say that the TCA–Atlantic Division will be added to their Gold Book of special donors on August 18, 2011.
