

Member's Layouts on Display

As a follow up to an article in the *Fall 2021 AD Express*, Chris is well on his way to completing his dream layout. From its humble beginnings as an 8x14 foot layout it is now over 35 feet long. Long runs of freight cars pulled by three diesel engines travel the multiple mainlines. The layout is DCC, most of the engines have sound. Scenery is about 80% and Chris has plans to be 99% complete before the end of 2022. Anyone that has a layout knows you are never 100% complete. Feature Article – How to Light-up your Layout

Buildings on your layout can come alive when you light them up. One effortless way is to put wax paper over the inside walls and plop a 12V light inside. But the authentic way to add more life in a building is to decorate the inside with people and interior walls.

Step one is to search the internet for pictures of the type of interior you want, e.g., "pictures of office interiors," factory, etc. Download them, crop, and scale them to 1/48. Knowing that a typical door is 3 x 6' 8" you can use a scale figure to help you out. While you are at it, download some tile patterns and rug patterns as well. I printed mine on card stock.

Go to Amazon or Hobby Lobby (close to Christmas) and buy LED light strings. You can cut the strings to the length you need and scrape off a small bit of the coating on the ends of the wires so you can solder it to the power supply. These lights operate at around 2.5-5 V DC, so a good power supply is an old DC power pack (usually \$1-5) at local meets. I use a Buckboard converter to control the voltage. There is an adjustment screw on the *Buckboard* so you can dial down to the appropriate voltage. You can feed several boards from one source and several strings of lights from one board but if your lights exceed the amps coming from your source, the output voltage will drop to zero to protect the board. I have one power pack whose output bounces around from 6-13 volts (it is the \$1 one) but the output from the board is a steady 4.5V DC. If your lights do not on the top. Push button bottom light up, reverse the wires on the *Buckboard*.

Putting interior walls, floors, and people inside a building is like building a ship in a bottle – you must plan ahead. You can only assemble three walls. The last one (usually blank) will be put on last and it will not be glued but just 'basted' with a few dabs of Walther's *Goo* which will give you access to fix anything later.

Cut and fold your interior walls and figure out where they need to be glued to the outside walls. If you have a second story building it helps to put in supports on the inside walls to hold up the floor. The second floor (stiff cardboard) should be just

below the bottom of the windows. Any higher and you will only see the tops of the people.

Warm up your glue gun and get ready to go.

- (1) You need to drill a hole in your tabletop where the wire from the lights will exit the building to get to the power source. Glue the end of the light string on the wall where it exits.
- (2) Glue the light string around all the walls with windows. (See Fig. 1) Notice the paper tab sticking out. I had to glue two interior walls together on the outside wall. This building had two adjacent blank walls, usually there is only one.

- (3) Stand the building up, glue it onto the floor.
- (4) Put the walls in place. Make necessary adjustments, e.g., trim to fit around a wire, etc.
- (5-A) When satisfied, glue the interior walls to the outside walls.

OR ---(5-B) When satisfied, glue the interior walls to a thin sheet of stiff plastic and then glue it to the outside walls.



- (6) Place people on the bottom floor and glue them in place (see Fig. 2)
- (7) Rest the second story floor on top of the walls and see if it is sturdy (see Fig 3-end view & Fig 4) and then repeat steps 4, 5 and 6.
- (8) Place it on the layout, thread the wire down under, put a few dabs of Goo on the fourth wall and put it in place. (See finished project below)
