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

# GEMS Of Track Planning

A Selection of Real Life Junction and Crossing Layouts to Help You Plan a Better Pike You may doodle curves and crossovers and switches on your drawing board all day long, but you can't beat real life. The railroads of this country have more track arrangements than you can catalog, and from hem you can pick a setup to solve almost any operating necessity. Suppose you want to join two double track lines, perhaps your River Division and your Mountain

Route. A double track junction sounds simple, but should you include a crossover to permit wrong main moves, do you need and sidings, and where do you put the signals? Well, the varieties are endless, but somewhere you'll find a double track junction to just fit your particular needs.




## Campbell Hall

In the railroad wonderland of southern New York state, at Campbell Hall, a branch line of the Erie crosses the double track Erie Graham Freight line, a main route. This is an important interchange point, for much Erie freight leaves the main line here for New England via New Haven. Yard layout at junction shows scheme.

#### Erie. Bellville, N.J.

Another Erie interlocking is Tower OJ at Bellville, N.J. Here the single track to Orange come into the double track main. Forest Hill station is in the junction.






### **Boston & Albany Tower 50**

Right in the main line of the Boston & Albany, for no ready reason, is layout of a trailing this point crossover and numerous signaled sidings. It's ay Chester, bottom of the grade up the Berkshires. where the helpers couple on. Use same layout for busy small station.





#### Feather River Canyon

Deep in the Feather River Canyon of California two lines of the Western Pacific join at Keddie. The junction wye is festooned with tunnels and high steel bridges across the canyon. In one direction is San Francisco, in another Oregon, while up the canyon is the Sierra summit and the line to Salt Lake City.

## Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific, Blue Island, ILL.

The Rock Island junction between main line and suburban loop at Blue Island, III., is more complicated than you may ever want on a model railroad, but it's very complications include many an idea which can be lifted and used. A freight yard lies between the two lines. Notice the copious use of crossovers to allow passing moves.





## Erie Glen Rock, N.J.

The Erie main line divides into two double track routes near Glen Rock, N.J. Trackage at the WJ tower- junction includes duplicate crossovers.
